What Happened?



Approximately five years ago, on January 29, 2017, the Islamic Cultural Centre of Quebec City was subjected to a tragic, hateful and Islamophobic crime. A gunman who was radicalized with white supremacist ideology entered the place of worship and opened fire on the worshipers, killing 6 men and injuring many more.

As we approach January 29, it is important for us to be mindful that this time can be increasingly difficult for Muslim staff, students and families.

What is the Green Square Campaign?



The Green Square Campaign takes place in the week leading up to January 29 every year to remember the victims and survivors of the Quebec City mosque attack. The green square represents the green carpets of the Quebec City mosque, where the victims last stood to pray. It symbolizes the fact that the deceased are, God willing, in a garden green, in a better place since they left us that night.

Wear the green square in solidarity with the six widows, the seventeen children left fatherless, Aymen Derbali who is left paralyzed for life, and every single person suffering the consequences of this hateful and despicable act of violence.

As of January 2020, the Federal Government has designated January 29th as the day to remember the victims of the Islamic Cultural Centre of Quebec Shooting.

The survivors of this tragic act of terror wish to towards a better future for Canadian Muslims and for us all to focus on being part of meaningful Action against Islamophobia.

Addressing this day meaningfully within safe spaces like schools and classrooms becomes essential in the mission to be equitable educators against Islamophobia.

Creating Safe Spaces - Trauma Informed Approach

Mental Health Supports

A strong trauma-informed response is to offer Muslim students, colleagues and families mental health support as needed throughout the upcoming days to January 29th. Below are culturally responsive mental health supports:

1. Khalil Center : is a psychological and spiritual community wellness center advancing the professional practice of psychology rooted in Islamic principles.
2. Cedarway Therapy: trained and experienced clinicians from diverse backgrounds, speaking different languages (English, French, Arabic, Urdu, Gujarati, Hindi, Punjabi), and offering culturally and spiritually responsive services
3. Affective Consulting and Psychotherapy: Low cost, private psychotherapy service geared towards supporting Muslim youth
4. Salaam Canada: organization dedicated to support young queer Muslims
